Daily short sessions

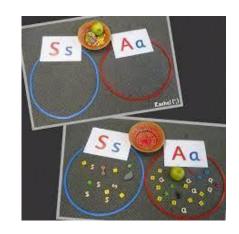
Specific order of teaching

Repeated practice

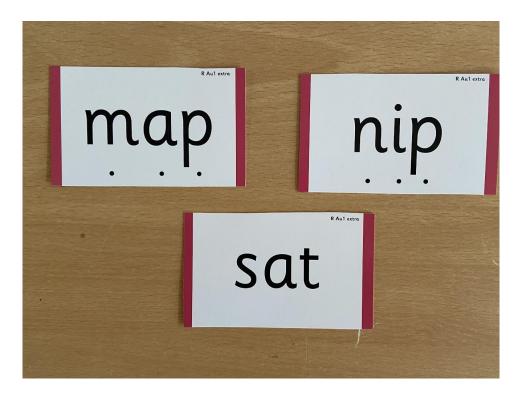
Revisit previously taught sounds at start of each lesson





Blending

Blending is the process of combining sounds together to create a word. For example, the word cat is made up of three sounds /c/-/a/-/t/ together these sounds produce the spoken word cat.



Segmenting

Segmenting is the process of breaking a word down into its individual sounds. For example the word cat is made up of three sounds. You can break it down into its three sounds $\frac{d}{-o}$. These sounds are referred to as phonemes, which are individual sounds. For example, the word **dog** is made up of 3 phonemes.

In the word dog there are three letters and three sounds.



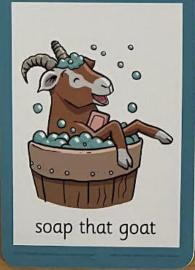

Reading underpins children's access to the curriculum and clearly impacts on their achievement

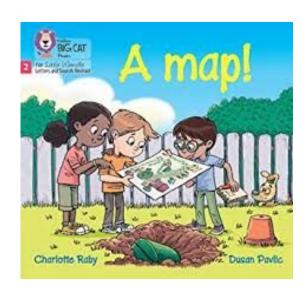
How we teach reading

Reading practice sessions are: Books are:

Timetabled 3 times a week Taught in small groups and individually



Matched to children's secure phonic knowledge and word reading



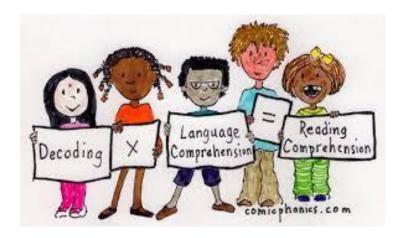
Reading Practice Books are carefully matched so children can read fluently and independently.

2 Reads – each one begins with some quick phoneme and words practice

- 1. Decoding
- Prosody

 (intonation, expression)

 and Comprehension



Teachers hear children read individually once a week.

When children take their book home to read they should be 95% fluent Please do not worry that a book is too easy – your child needs to develop fluency and confidence in reading. Re-reading a book they have had before helps develop fluency – this is the goal.

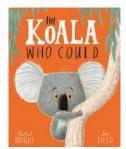

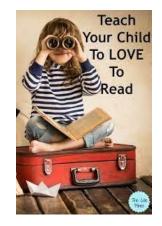
Children will also bring home a 'sharing book' from our class library box each week
